This workshop helps you understand the structure of your own sign language.



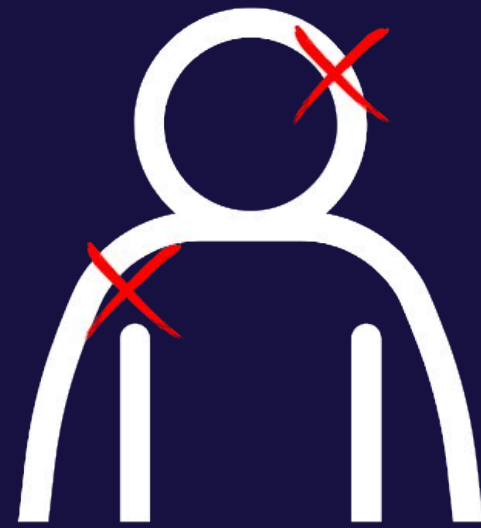

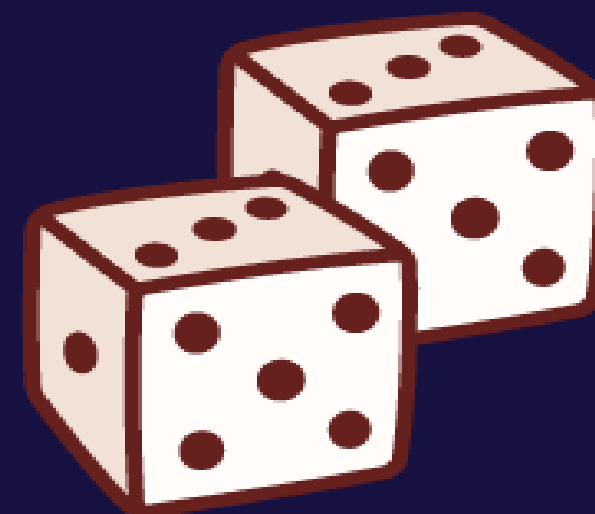

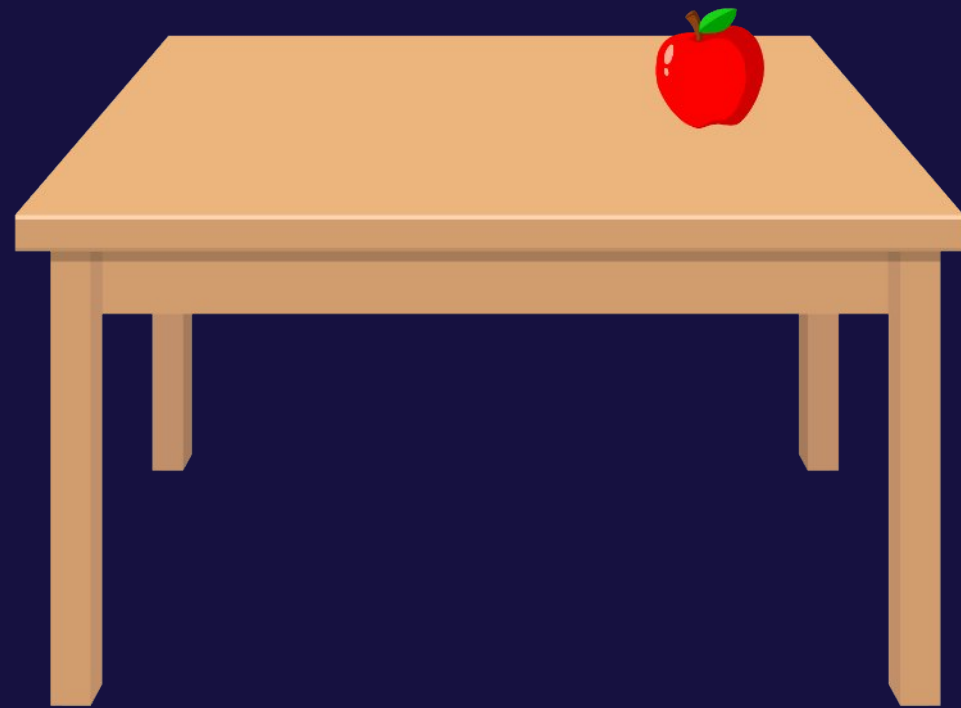

SOV

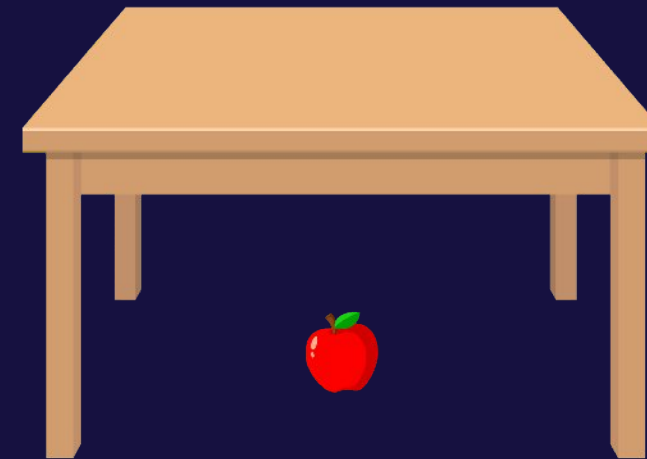
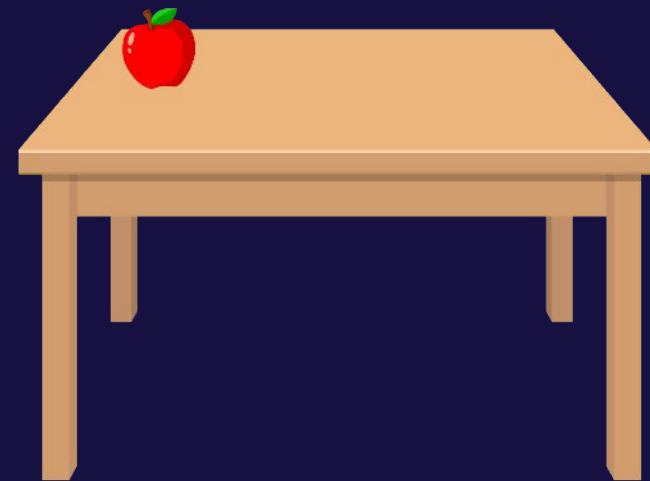
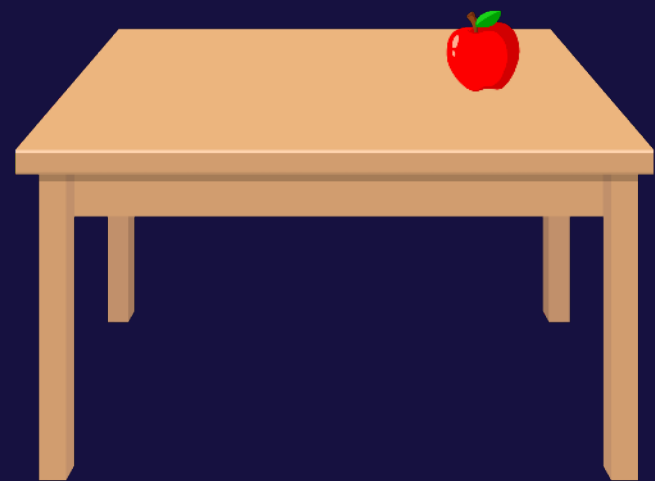
(subject - object - verb)

Localization

Localization:

Use different hand positions to show what the situation is.



“Where does she live?”

How would you sign this?





Question structure

Question word at end
of the sentence

non-manual
+ mark

SHE LIVE **WHERE?**

eyebrows up
(question face)



Sentences for question formation

Practice:

What is your name?

- Where is your office?
- Why are you doing this?
- Who is that new person?
- How can we approach this in the best way?

“I don’t work”

How would you sign this?



Negation

Practice:

I don't want to come.

- They aren't here.
- I am not surprised.
- Why you didn't take that apple?
-

“She gives him a book.”

How would you sign this?



Verb direction

SHE BOOK GIVE HIM

“give” move from she -> him

SHE APPLE GIVE HIM

“give” in the form of an apple move from she -> him



Verb direction

Practice:

He tells her a story.

- They help us.
- She teaches them.
- I explain it to them.
- I give a cup of coffee to him.
