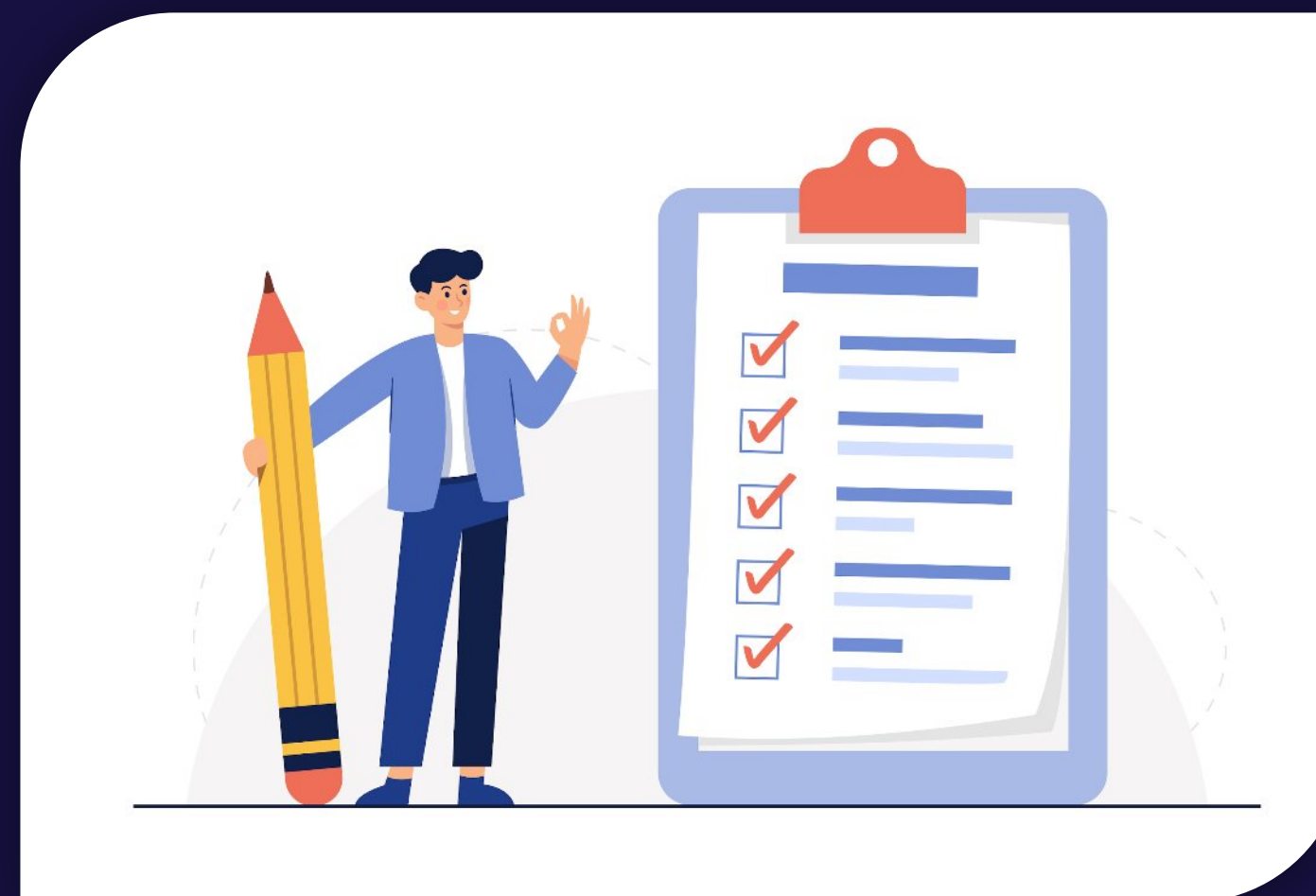

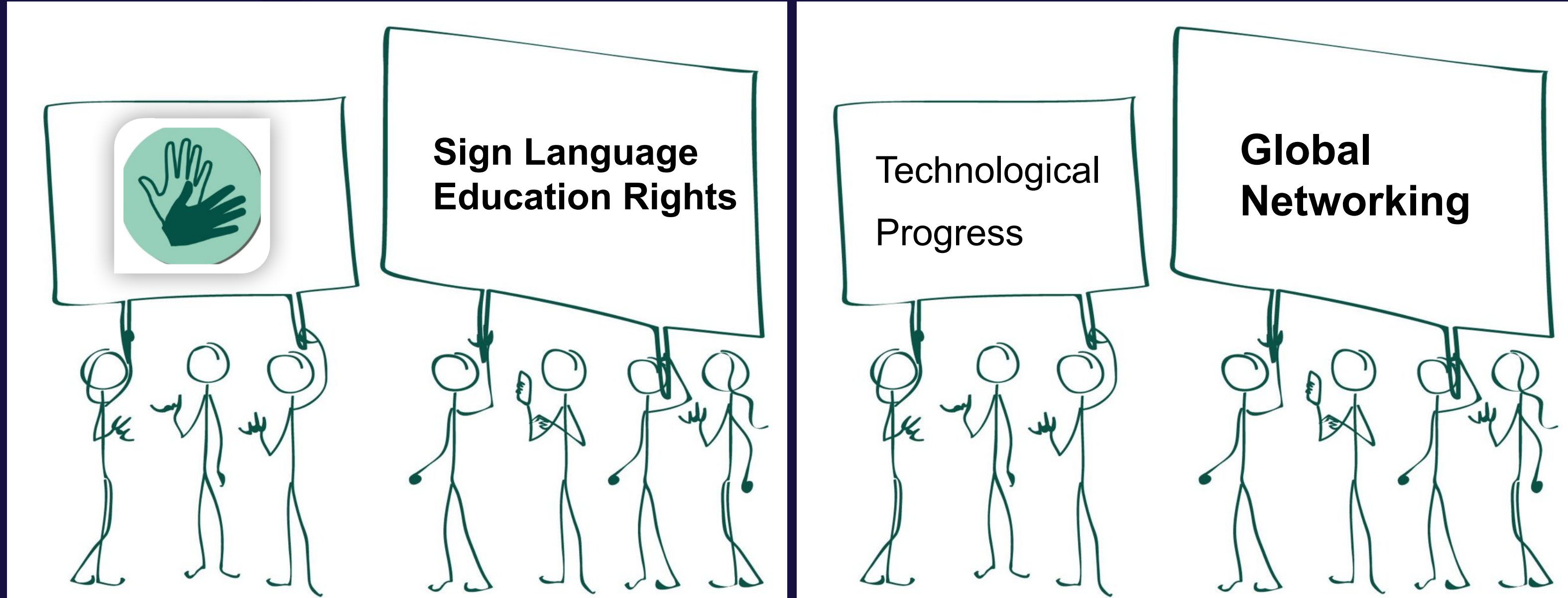


The **activism** is characterized by

- cultural autonomy

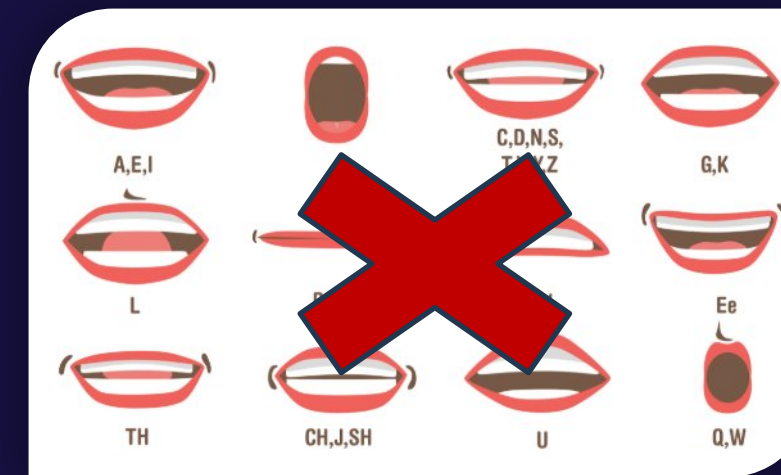
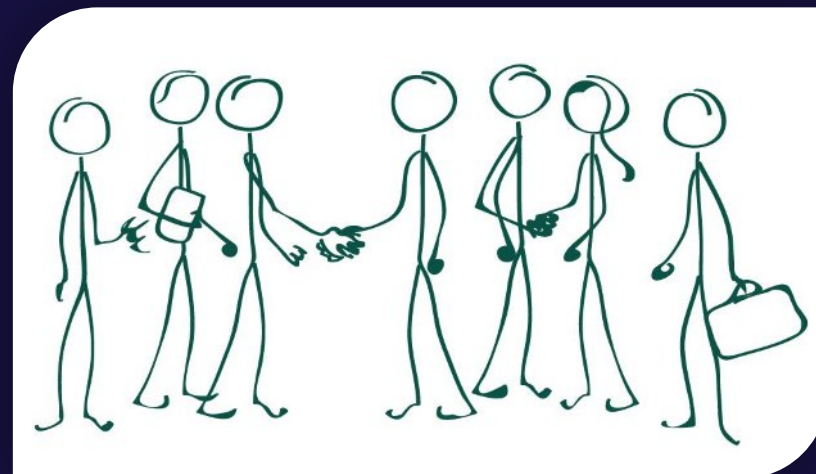


Important Milestones



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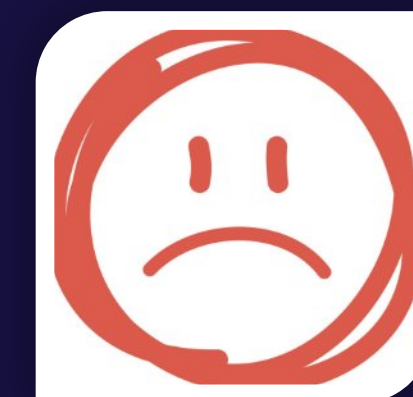
Beginnings - 19. and early 20. Century



Foundation of associations and federations, especially in Europe and the USA
Example: National Association of the Deaf (NAD), USA, 1880

Contents / Situation:

- Sign language instead of lip reading
- Many Deaf people were **excluded** from the education system or **isolated** in specialized institutions..



Cultural Movement Sign Language Activism (1920-1960)

Turning point:

Sign Language = independent language

1960: **William Stokoe**

publishes the groundbreaking work **Sign Language Structure**

- = Linguistic recognition of sign language
- = Promotion of the protection of sign languages
- = Foundation of sign language movements

Movement: Sign language as part of cultural identity

Activism: Demand for recognition and self-determination



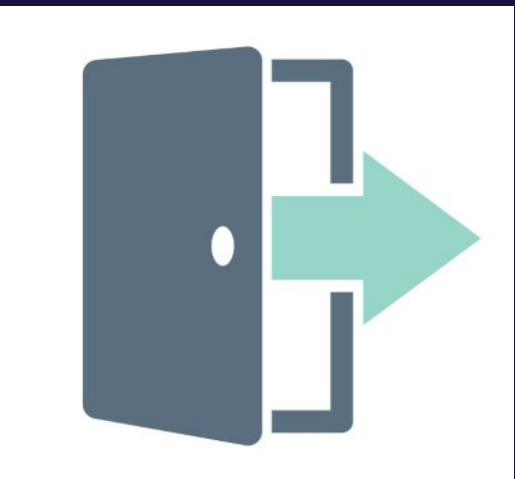
Civil Rights Movement of the 1960s and 1970s

Fight for equality:



- US ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act)
= Legal regulations for people with disabilities

- Demand for access to education, employment, politics, and culture.



“Deaf President Now” (DPN) 1988:

- Protest movement at Gallaudet University in Washington, D.C.
- Students demand the election of a Deaf president — a significant success!



**Self-advocacy — Respect — Sign Language —
Founding organizations — “Nothing about us without us!”**

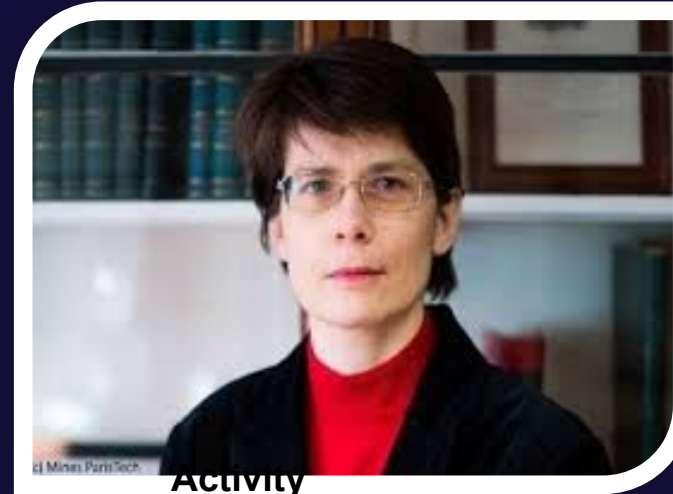

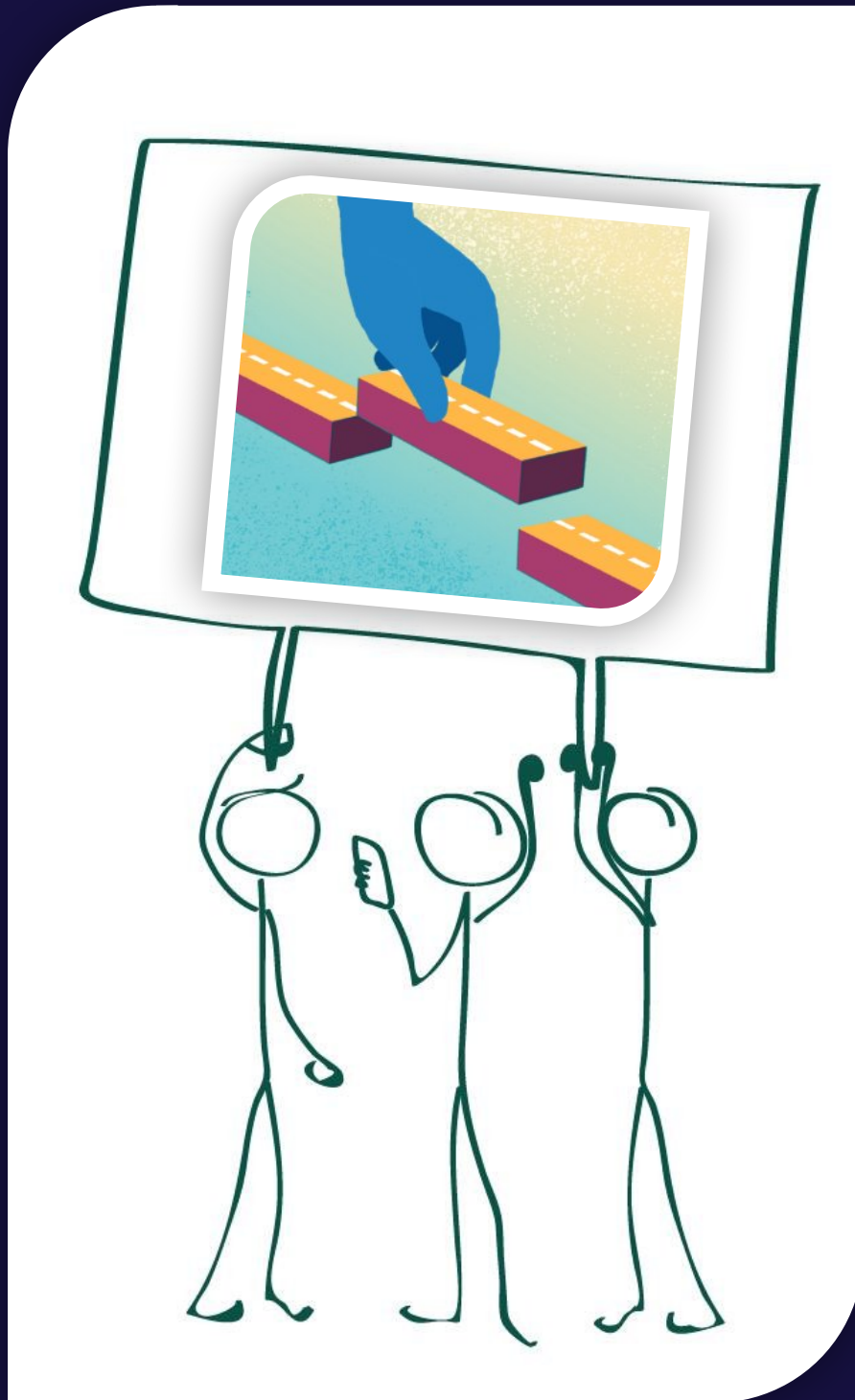

History of Deaf Activism

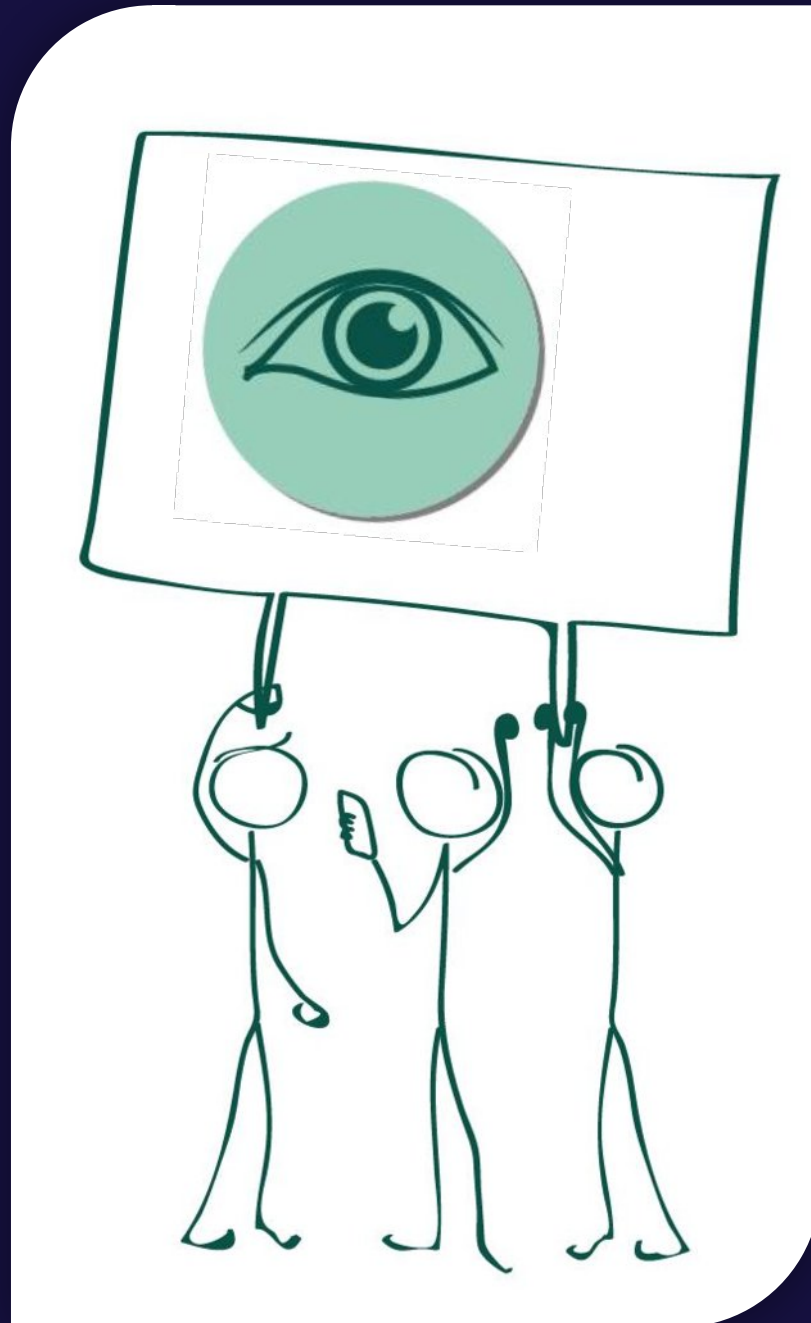
= **Courage - Creativity - Commitment to Equality**
