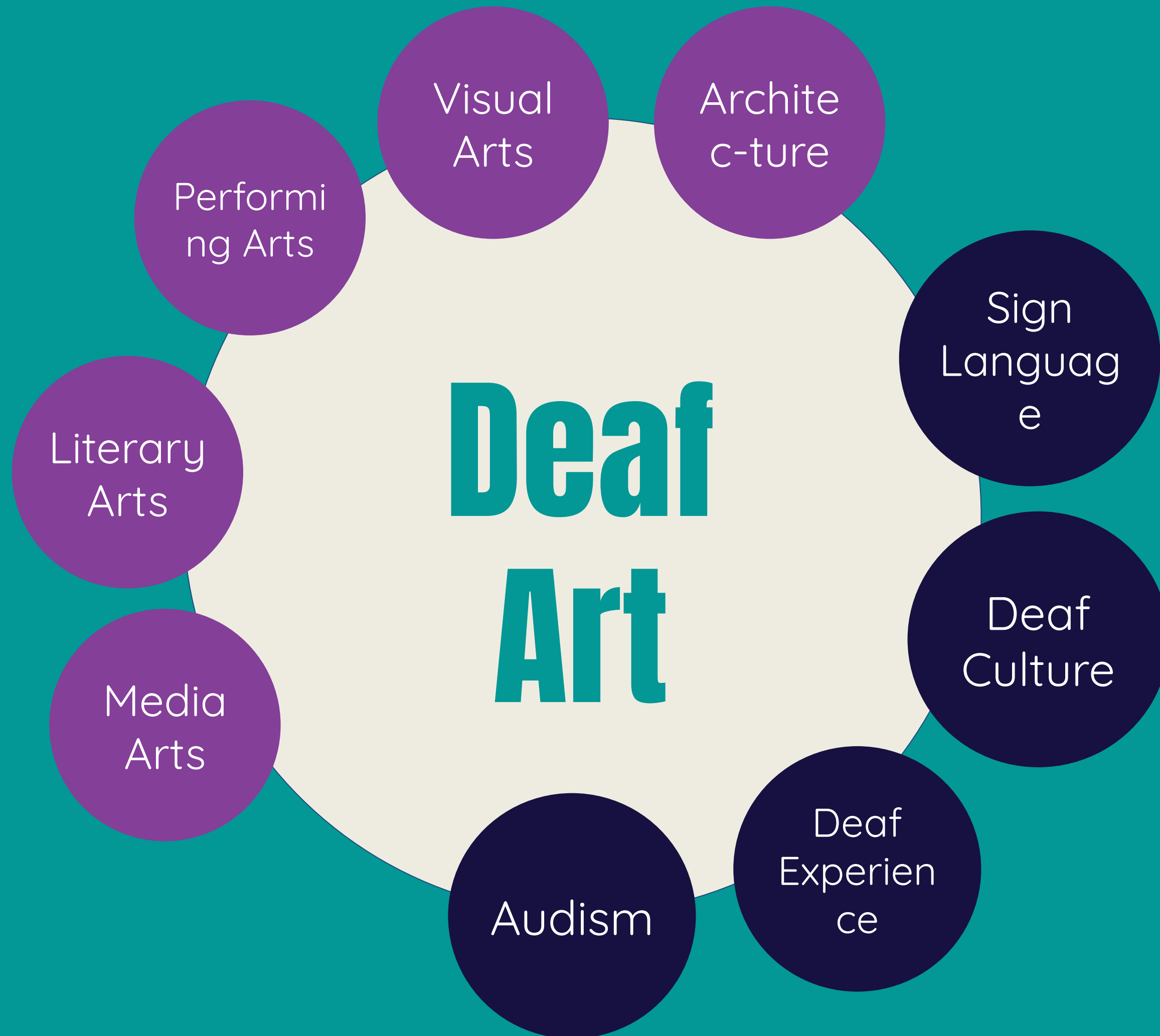

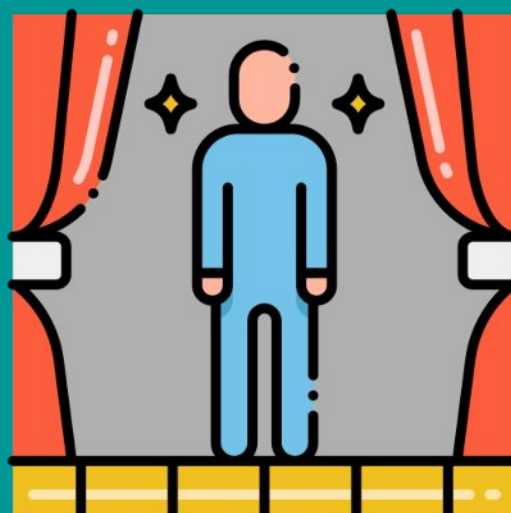

Deaf Art

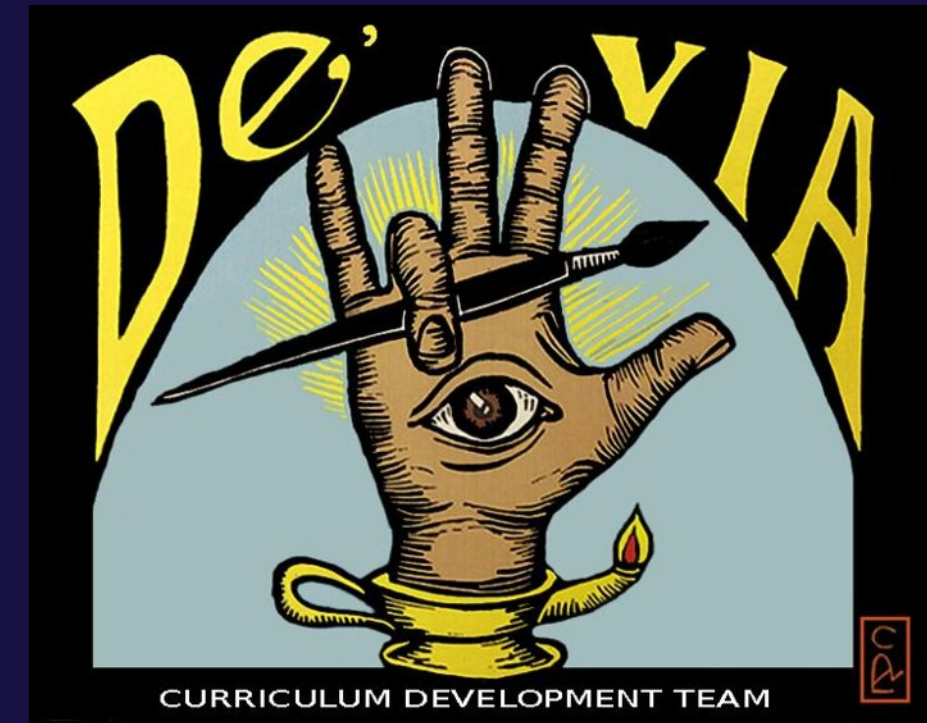
In the 20th century, particularly after the World Wars, Deaf artists began to focus more explicitly on themes related to deafness, the everyday experiences of being Deaf, Audism, the fight for rights, and the importance of sign language.

This trend gained significant momentum in the 1960s, especially in the United States.

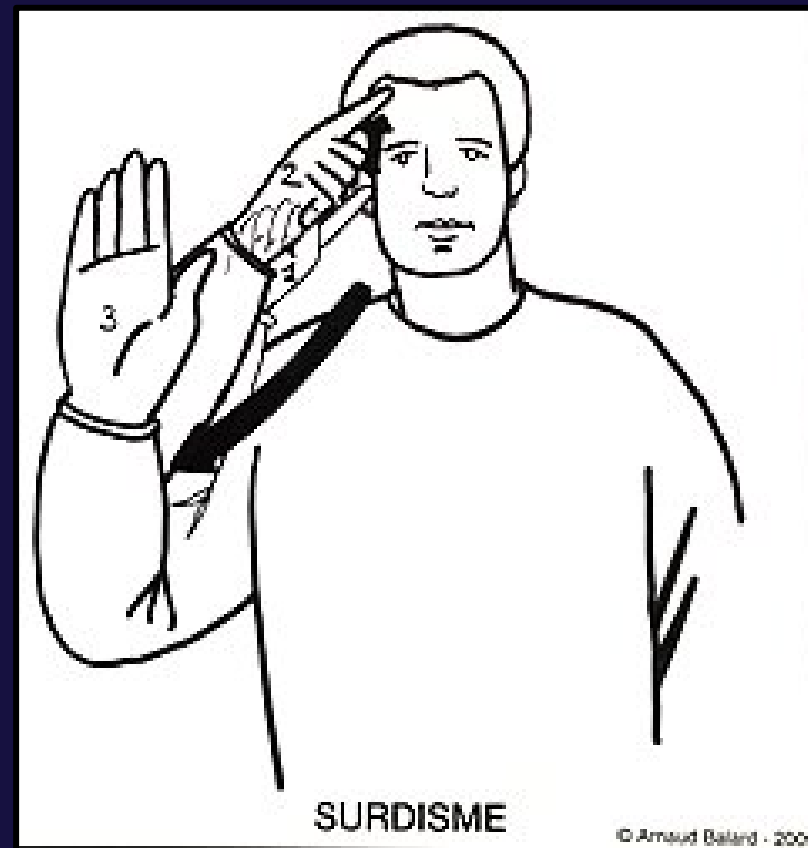


De' Via (Deaf View/Image Art)

De'VIA (Deaf View/Image Art)

De'VIA is an art movement that examines and expresses the experiences of Deaf people from cultural, linguistic, and intersectional perspectives. It was born from a group of artists just before the Deaf Way Festival in 1989.

The Four Elements of De'VIA:

- **De**: Expression of *affirmation, resistance*, and liberation for Deaf and DeafBlind individuals.
- **V**: The Deaf and DeafBlind perspective and their way of living in the world.
- **I**: Images, motifs, and symbols representing the Deaf experience (visualization).
- **A**: Art, activism, aesthetics, and authentic expression of the Deaf experience.



De' VIA - Motifs

- Hands, Eyes, Mouths, Ears
- Children
- Animals (dogs, birds, butterflies, moths, fish, horse, elephant)
- Nature (trees, flowers, especially sunflowers and dandelions, waves or mountain)
- Doors as portals or obstacles
- Musical reference for ASL (scores, notes, instruments)
- Masks, puppets, dolls, robots
- Street signage, mirrors, light bulb, bell, glove, blue tape, bridge, hammer, CI, stockades, cross, key
- Chains, gird, jail, rope, barbed wire, hooks
- Many more...

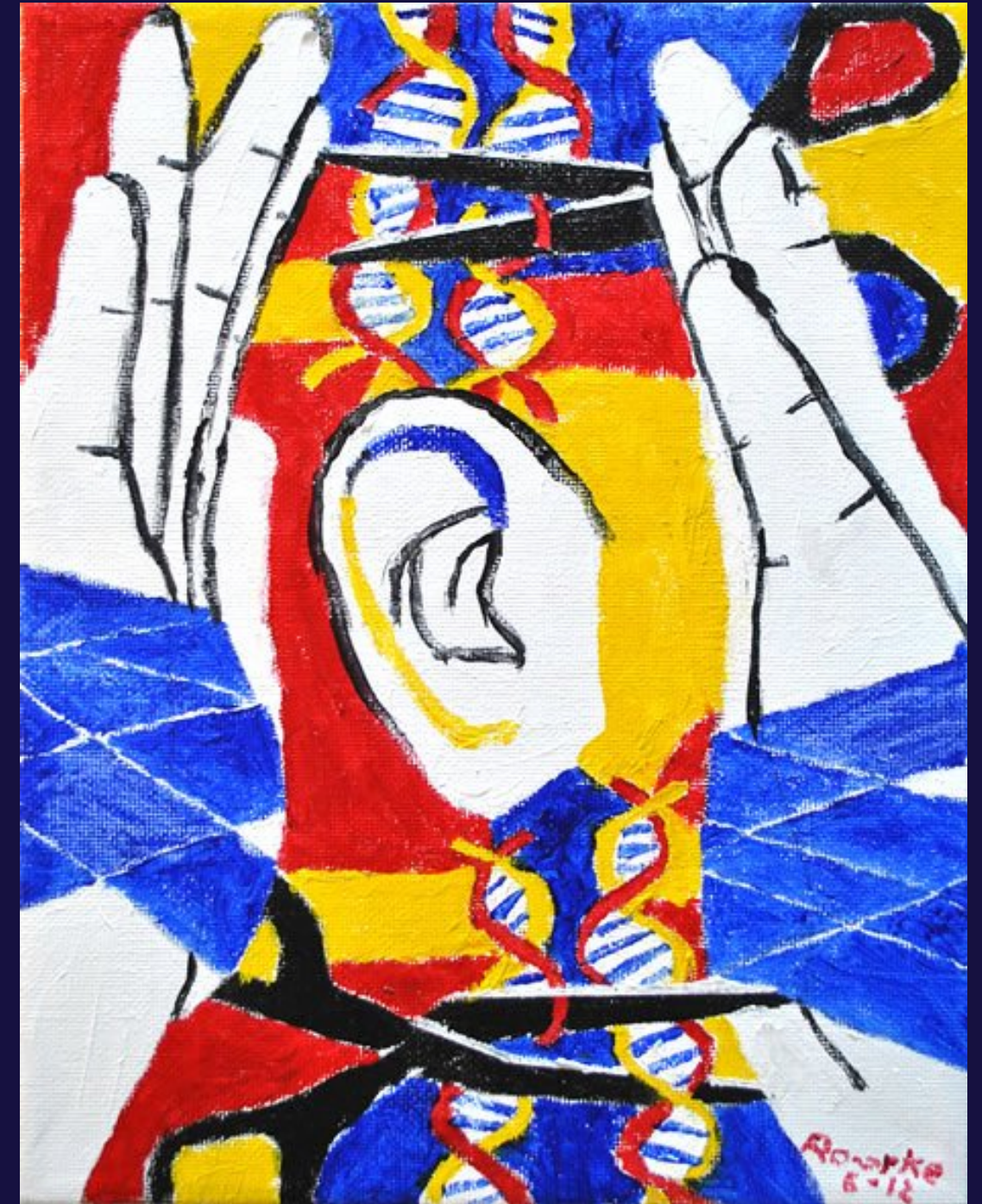

Surdism

The **Surdism** Manifesto was created by French Deafblind artist and activist – **Arnaud Balard** in 2009 at the 20th anniversary of De'VIA – despite Arnaud having no knowledge or exposure to Deaf View/Image Art De'VIA.

The Surdism Manifesto is a similar assertion of visual art that is unique to the **Deaf experience** and it expands to include **other genres of cultural expression** such as: film, theatre, literature (signed and written). It also includes terms and concepts such as *audism* and *Deafhood* and calls for an activist component to Deaf-themed art making (ie **ARTivism**).
